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

Since we are no longer obligated to the fast before Christmas, let us prepare ourselves spiritually for the Glorious Birth of Our Lord by going to confession, receiving the Eucharist and attending the Christmas Novena which runs from the 15th through the 23rd of December.

Please note that the Novena is always celebrated with and after the Masses: On week-days at 6:30 PM, and on weekends after the Saturday & Sunday Masses.

Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you shall call his name John (Luke 1:57-66)

The birth of John completes the family of Zachariah & Elizabeth. With the presence of relatives and neighbors, the parameter of the family broadens and happiness ensues. But with the presence of the Virgin Mary, the happiness of the family reaches a fiver pitch, because the birth of John proclaims the birth of Jesus. Further, the birth of John brought happiness to the house of his elderly father, to his barren mother and to the neighbors and relatives, because God's love to his people is renewed. His name is "John" which means "the compassionate God." It points out to a new phase in God's salvific plan and to the fidelity of God's promise to his people. "And the hand of God was with him" is a scriptural expression explaining that God called John to a special prophetic mission, just like Elijah and the rest of the prophets, because he is going to "prepare a people fit for the Lord" (Luke 1:17).

Among the more fascinating figures in Scripture, the person of John stands out. Certainly he is a "Surprise Baby" since Zechariah and Elizabeth had been unable to conceive a child. The time had long passed for new life to emerge from their marriage. Yet the God of grace and surprise was not bound by human expectations. Grace builds on nature and brings new life out of the most barren circumstances. When human powers have been spent, the grace of God shines through our weaknesses and limitations. The conception of John is a foretasting of God's ultimate act of grace and life in Jesus. The new age of grace is dawning.

Scriptural Names are expressive. They are a reflection or a projection of someone's life which expresses the meaning of a particular action. For example: Hosea's children's names, Jezreel, Unloved, and not-my-people, are given by their father as a result of their mother's action. Mshee-ho (Aramaic), Massih (Arabic), Messiah with the English transliteration and means the Anointed one, the Savior. Yuhanon (Aramaic), Hanna or Hannan (Arabic), John (English) means compassion. The name "John' expresses God's action of love toward Elizabeth and Zechariah by answering their prayers. It further expresses the compassion that God has toward humanity at large.

There are spells of lifelessness in our life. We feel the reproach of the world, which is too much with us: Where is your God? Where is the sign of grace that brings forth new life? Even in the midst of so many lights we fail to see the One Who is Light. Yet it is in the absence of God that we may come to feel his presence. The wilderness speaks of the absence of God and the deep longing in the human heart for home. God is never indifferent to what happens to us, his children. He cares about the world which he created. The idea of wilderness is prominent in the Scripture. It is the place of void and emptiness, the place of demons and temptation. The wilderness is also a space for God's face. For it is in wanderings that we grow weary and turn to the God who is in search of us.

John is the one who will preach about the coming of the Messiah. John is about the business of preparing hearts for the coming of the One Who takes the crooked and makes it straight, the rough and turns it smooth. It is into the wilderness of our heart and everyday lives that the Word must become flesh. When our human efforts and powers are spent, when we have become aware of our lowliness, smallness and imperfection, then grace proclaims, "God lives...God lives in you." "A voice cries out in the wilderness, prepare the way of the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God!" (Isaiah 40:3).
