Sunday of the Righteous & Just

Qurbano P. 157; Creed P. 748; Anaphora of St. John p. 815

Sundays of Commemoration: Jan. 21, 28 & Feb 4, 2024

After the commemoration of the Deceased Priests our Church commemorates the Righteous and the Just who are the children of the church. They are her pride and joy because they strive to emulate the Lord and to live throughout their personal lives the kingdom of heaven in its most beautiful picture. This is why the church offers them as a living example and intercessors to the faithful. They are: Mary the Mother of God, the prophets, apostles, martyrs, confessors, the righteous and just, the chosen saints who sit on the right hand of God. Countless individuals have sanctified their lives through struggle and hardship against evil, for the love of Jesus, the redeemer Lord.

Today's gospel depicts prophetically the day of judgment. Christ is the shepherd, the king and the supreme judge. He sits on his royal throne and judges all peoples according to deeds of mercy they have done or charitable deeds they have failed to do. Every deed we do or any act of kindness we make to help a needy person, we have done it to Jesus himself! The Judgment confirms that what people do in this present age actually brings eternity to our world and plants it in front of our very eyes, transforming all human attempts and actions, no matter how simple they might be, to a decisive plan and an eternal choice. The judgment scale consists of six human initiatives upon which people are measured: give food to the hungry, give water to the thirsty, welcome a stranger, clothe the needy and homeless, care for the sick and visit the imprisoned. It is according to our response to these initiatives that we are judged. Such deeds and actions in our personal life on earth, or the lack thereof, decide whether we may be counted among the hosts of the Righteous and the Just in heaven.

This parable is so vivid and unique like no other in the gospel, whereby it opened the way to heaven to the simplest people with acts of charity. There are those who cannot stop from helping others, and those who help if they are recognized and praised publicly. Those who helped did not think they were helping Jesus. Their good deeds earned them the joy of eternity. They were not expecting anything in return because they could not stop themselves from helping. The excuse of those who failed to help would be like: "Had I known it was you Lord I would have gladly help. I thought it was some unimportant person out there who is not worth helping." The help that wins the heart of God is that which is given for nothing in return. Jesus faces us with this crystal clear truth: all kind of help, if given is given to himself, and if withheld is withheld from himself.

The feast of The Righteous and Just (All Saints) is celebrated in the West on November 1st. Originally the word "saint" was synonymous with martyr, i.e., someone who witnesses faith in Christ even to death. After a martyr's death, local Christians endeavored to bury the body in a tomb that would be accessible to the faithful. By the fifth century there was already a feast of "righteous and just" in the East, on the Friday of Easter week, which was called "all saints" in the West. In the ninth century Pope Gregory IV changed the date of this feast to November 1st. Further, those who had endured torture for the faith, but did not face death (martyrdom), were given the title "confessors" and were actually treated with great respect and dignity. Eventually, Christians who led heroic gospel-inspired lives were often acclaimed after their death as saints by a local church. The theology and the celebration of this unique feast emphasize the bond between those Christians already with God and those who are still on earth.
