

Listening to the Word, Martha & Mary (Luke 10:38-42)

This Sunday tells us of the two sisters who received Jesus at their home. Martha was anxious, upset and busy tending to many hospitality details by herself. Whereas Mary sat by the feet of Jesus listening to him. Saint Luke stresses the importance of hearing the "Word" of the Gospel and listening to it. Thus the famous quote: "Mary has chosen the better portion and she shall not be deprived of it."

We see Martha and Mary without reference to time or location in this story because St. Luke mentions them in Jesus' journey from Galilee to Jerusalem (9:51 & 19:28). We find them with the same character in chapter 11, in the gospel of St. John. However John gives Martha a significant role whereby she repeats, verbatim, what Peter said in the Gospel of St. Matthew (16:16): "You are the Messiah, the Son of the Living God!" expressing the real identity of Jesus. Martha's sole interest here was to serve. She wants her sister to help in serving Jesus rather than sitting and visiting with him. That is why, she was gently reproved: "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and upset about many things." Whereas Mary's attention was approved: "Mary has chosen the better portion." Although St. Luke emphasizes listening to the Word, this does not mean that one can do without serving, meditating or working. All of these compliment each other just as it appeared in the parable of the Good Samaritan, which preceded the story of Martha and Mary. In the story of the Good Samaritan we learn about the love of the neighbor, thus, living the Second Commandment.

Jesus was interested more in Martha listening to his instruction than in preparing a meal. She needs to prepare only one dish. He told Martha only "one thing is required" referring to Mary who has chosen the "better portion" which will not be taken away from her. The lesson here is to help us understand that "the one thing" that is needed is to listen to the "Word." Priority is given to the hearing of God's word over preoccupation with many other concerns. Although Martha wanted to honor Jesus with a fancy dinner, he told her that it is more important to listen to what he has to say.

Two important points can be deduced from the story of Martha and Mary. (1) By listening to the word of Jesus we are obeying God, and thus, living the First Commandment. Martha's service was not repudiated by Jesus, but it took place at the wrong time. Here Jesus was on his way to Jerusalem to face crucifixion and death. To have an elaborate dinner was probably the last thing on his mind. His stop at his friend's house in Bethany was like taking a break from the demanding crowds. He wanted them to know what his teaching and ministry is all about. And (2) St. Luke depicts a woman as a disciple sitting at Jesus' feet and listening to him. This explains all the more that Jesus is proclaiming the Good News to everyone: Jews and Gentiles, men and women, old and young, educated and illiterate, sinners as well as righteous and just.

The character of both sisters is acceptable because with Martha we see the perfect hostess and with Mary, the perfect disciple. However, we must react differently to each and every situation. We must give priority to what is at hand and act accordingly. The greatest problem most of us commit is that we often want to be kind to people but we want to do it our way. Unfortunately, we take offense when our way is not the necessary one. Most of the time our selfishness gets in the way. In order for our kindness to be effective and desirable we ought to see into the heart of those we are trying to help. Many a time we want to please God, we pray, we fast and abstain, we get wrapped up in our own way of telling God what we want. The best prayer we make is when we sit still, close our eyes, listen to what God wants from us, meditate and act upon his "Word." Lord help us come to you, listen to you and serve you and others in a spirit of Love. Amen.
