# First Sunday after Holy Cross

Qurbono P. 606; Creed P. 748; Anaphora of The Twelve Apostles p. 754

Mk 10:35-45

Jesus announced several times his passion and death and always tied them with his resurrection and his glory at the right hand of the Father. As for James and John, the sons of Zebedee, they requested to be seated on his right and on his left without mentioning his passion and death. Jesus reminded them that the price of glory is to drink the cup of sacrifice and pain. Therefore, this first Sunday allows us to enter the Season of the Cross and prepares us, through the course of our life along with all of its suffering and temptation, to rise with the Lord in the glory of his Kingdom.

Both Mark and Matthew connect the request of the two disciples, James and John, directly with Jesus' third announcement of his passion, death and resurrection, as they were going up to Jerusalem. They requested of him to seat them on his right and on his left in his glory. He reminded them of his passion and death before he enters into his glory. The answer of Jesus was crystal clear in that the two disciples will enter into glory with him because they will endure suffering with him and for him. But with regards to sitting in the first place, this has been reserved to the Father. Jesus points out the way to glory by his own death. Only the Father can bestow that glory, at least until Jesus has received the full measure of his Messianic authority through his resurrection. The mission of Jesus on earth is not to reward mankind, but to prepare them to reach the reward in the glory of the kingdom through his death and resurrection. He is the "Son of Man who has come to serve and not be served—to give his life in ransom for the many."

The disciples along with the majority of the Jews at the time had a misconception about the kingdom of Jesus which was widely prophesied by the prophets of the Old Testament. They thought of the kingdom of Jesus to be an earthly one which was going to liberate Israel from the oppression of the Roman Empire. James and John were ambitious to become among those who will rule with him. The kingdom of Jesus is not of this world, it is not set on earthly thrones and castles but in the hearts and the lives of his followers.

It is easy to say that we are willing to accept and endure any suffering and pain for the sake of Jesus. Although we mean that very sincerely, most of us complain as soon as we face the least difficulty. If we claim that we are ready to suffer for Jesus, then we must be prepared to accept this suffering no matter how difficult it might be. Notice that Jesus did not scold James and John but he denied their request. In turn we might be asking God for a favor and it may be denied. God always gives us what is best for us and not what we ask for, because he denies some of our requests for our own good.

When the other ten disciples became indignant at James and John, Jesus called them all and gave them a simple instruction on greatness. He explained to them that he who wishes to be great must prove it through service. The disciple of Jesus is to reverse the customary practice whereby those in authority rule by force. The disciple's new conduct must be the willingness to serve the needs of all. A ransom was to be paid in order to free a slave. Jesus paid this ransom on our behalf since we were not capable of paying it. His death has freed us from the slavery of sin, and that is the reason of his death.

In our present world, greatness is measured through personal success and achievement. We may be aspiring for great things in life. We look to achieve our goals through various ways and means and this may harm others and hamper our spiritual success. If we aspire for greatness with Jesus and are working to gain eternal life and earn a great share in the heavenly kingdom, then serving the needs of all whom we encounter is the right path.
