### The Finding of the Lord in the Temple

Qurbono P. 87; Creed P. 748; Anaphora of St. John Chrysostom p. 876

#### The finding of our Lord in the Temple (Luke 2:41-52)

This is the last Sunday in the Glorious Season of the Birth of our Lord. Jesus is twelve years old. He is in the transitional year during which he leaves childhood to take on personal responsibility: "I have to be in my Father's house!"

Today's Gospel is the conclusion of the Infancy Narrative in St. Luke's Gospel. This period in the life of Jesus, mediates between his childhood and his adulthood where he begins his salvific mission, and precedes his public life. On his own initiative, Jesus remained in the Temple, in Jerusalem without the awareness of Mary and Joseph. When they have found him after three days, his mother asked him: "Why have you done this to us?" His decisive answer was: "Why were you looking for me, did you not know that I have to be in my father's house?" With this episode, Jesus confirmed that he belongs to a circle other than his human family, and that he is completely independent, where Mary and Joseph are concerned, due to the fact that he is the Son of God. Jesus here foretells of his passion, death and resurrection after three days, pointing out to his return to the Father. However, for the time being, he went with them to Nazareth and was obedient to them, due to his human disposition; and he "advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man." Through this act of obedience, Jesus remains the prefect example of every child who grows in all aspects of life—human and spiritual: in mind, body and soul.

#### Let us rejoice in the New Found Lord!

To rejoice and especially to "rejoice in the Holy Spirit" is something out of the ordinary. You may have no end of fun when you are at a party, but chances are you won't rejoice. To rejoice is to have deep gratitude and joy. To rejoice means to be at peace knowing that, at all times and in all places, God lives within us. The true JOY that Christmas brings is a much deeper experience than fun. Mary and Joseph were homeless as they searched for a room in that cold Bethlehem night. Mary clothed the baby as the poor did, in swaddling clothes, and placed Him in a feed-trough for animals. Yet her joy was deeper than those difficult circumstances. The great good news of Christmas is that we can look forward to a joy that depends not on the immediate surrounding, but on God's graciousness.

Conflicts, troubles, afflictions, friction, fighting and sickness make our life miserable. But it is after such circumstances that we experience true joy. Coming back from a long weekend after they went up to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover, Mary and Joseph realized that Jesus was missing and they went searching for Him. They probably did not sleep for three days. They went about frantically looking for Him. But their JOY was inexplicable when they found Him among scholars in the Temple. Do we have the urge of Mary and Joseph to look for Jesus when we he is missing from our lives? Do we look as enthusiastically for him as we look for something we have lost? If our joy is so great when we find that missing item, how much will we rejoice when we find Him in our personal lives?

Lord Jesus, thank you for allowing us to find you in ourselves—your new found temple—and for coming among us to show us the love of God, and most of all, thank you for saving us from our sins. May we take JOY and HOPE in the blessings you gave to Mary and Joseph, your first disciples and a symbol of your people.
