

Healing of the Paralytic

Qurbono P. 217; Creed P. 748; Anaphora of St. James p. 794

Healing of the Paralytic (Mark 2:1-12)

In the healing of the Leper, the hemorrhaging woman, and in the parable of the prodigal Son, the divine authority of Jesus appeared to forgive sins. But Jesus proved it in an extraordinary way when he healed the paralytic of Capernaum. The crowds who witnessed it "glorified God for bestowing upon mankind such an authority." Jesus in turn granted this authority to his apostles and they preserved it in the church as the sacred Mystery of repentance to reconcile all repentant sinners.

Most likely, in the house of Simon, in Capernaum, Jesus addressed the people "with the Word of God." This house became the symbol of the Church which is the meeting place to proclaim the Good News and the birth place of the mission of Jesus. The Evangelist emphasizes the faith of the men who carried the paralytic and opened the roof. Based upon their faith, it was announced to the paralytic: "My son! Your sins are forgiven!" This statement triggered an argument between Jesus and some of the scribes who claimed: "Who can forgive sins but God alone?" They thought that Jesus was unable to heal the paralytic and that is why he was evading that issue and was talking about the forgiveness of sins, because that is a hidden matter and no one can see that a healing took place but God alone! However, for Jesus, forgiving the paralytic was much more important than healing him. In order for all to understand his authority to forgive sins, Jesus ordered the paralytic to stand up! Right there and then, the paralytic got up in front of everyone healthy and justified!

Only Jesus knew the circumstances of the paralyzed man. In relaying God's message Jesus forgave the man's sins and healed him. This is where the problem of the Scribes lies. Although it was the obligation of devout Jews to forgive each other, they did not accept the public statement of Jesus. *They want so much to deny the authority Jesus claimed from heaven to remit the sins of men.* The crowds were amazed not only by the forgiveness granted and the immediate healing, but also by the fact that to Jesus, authority had been given for the sake of man's salvation. Not only did Jesus forgive the man's sins, but also Jesus healed him from his paralysis.

The breaking of the power of sin and destruction of evil imply the dawning Kingdom. By this miracle Jesus' question is a challenge to the Scribes to accept or reject his claim that the reign of God was visibly breaking in. In both instances, the healing and the forgiveness, even though the former is more dramatically visible, these are signs that God's kingdom on earth is being restored. For the Old Testament community, miracles were the purpose of proclaiming to humanity the gracious will of God and the sovereignty of his rule. Faith here plays a major role. In the healing of the paralytic, it is FAITH, which causes God to respond with his saving act. Jesus declares that wholeness "salvation" has been brought to the sufferer through his faith and those who brought him. On the one hand, Jesus was conveying God's compassion and forgiveness to mankind—something that God has already granted us. Jesus was acting on God's behalf. God delegated his powers and privileges to Jesus. The words Jesus spoke were none other than God's words. On the other hand, Jesus purposely performed a healing on the Sabbath to show the validity of his power and that his authority is not from mere human precepts but from Heaven. By healing, Jesus explained that the Law may be harsh and in many instances it may kill. He wants us to understand that it is MERCY He is looking for and not self-righteousness. The Law and the Letter should not be a stumbling block that interferes between God and us.

In spite of the fact that our souls are paralyzed by sin and our actions are hampered by evil,

our FAITH becomes the remedy, which leads us to being healed by God's compassion and love
